

Columbine

Aquilegia canadensis



With distinctive bell-shaped flowers and attractively lobed foliage, Columbine is a great addition to any garden. In late spring the red and yellow flowers are one of the first to provide much-needed nectar to hummingbirds and bees.

Plains Oval Sedge

Carex brevior



Plains Oval Sedge is a versatile plant that can grow in a variety of conditions, and makes a great alternative to typical landscape grasses. The spiky, rounded seed clusters turn a golden brown in fall and stand above the short, clumping plant.

Smooth Aster

Sympphytum laeve



A hardy late-bloomer, the Smooth Aster will last well after first frost with a sea of bluish lavender flowers. The flower is a host to the Pearl Crescent butterfly and is beneficial to many native bees.

Woodland Stonecrop

Sedum ternatum



Woodland stonecrop is an excellent groundcover which sports small, star-shaped white flowers reaching 6-8" in height. Once established, it requires little to no maintenance, making it a wonderful native groundcover option.

Western Sunflower

Helianthus occidentalis



The heat of summer is no match for the prolific golden yellow blooms of the Western Sunflower. The flowers are a favorite of bees, flies, and butterflies and the stems provide shelter for insects in the winter.

Bergamont

Monarda fistulosa



Bergamont is a favorite of many gardeners due to its unique, fringed flowers and tolerance for dry, bad soil. The light purple flowers are often visited by bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds. The fragrant foliage deters deer but smells quite nice.

Red Turtlehead

Chelone obliqua

The snap-dragon like shape of these flowers is said to resemble a turtle peeping its head from the shell, hence the name Turtlehead. The dark green, coarsely toothed leaves offer a contrast to the showy and long-lasting flowers.



Big Bluestem

Andropogon gerardii

Big Bluestem, also called Turkeyfoot for its large, three-pronged seed heads, is a staple grass of the central American prairie. Reaching 8' tall, it makes a great alternative to invasive ornamental grasses such as Miscanthus.

Orange Milkweed

Asclepias tuberosa



A well-known host of the Monarch butterfly caterpillar, this perennial has bright orange clusters of flowers. Plant in clumps of three or

more to support caterpillars. The plant does well in poor, dry soils and is quite tolerant of drought.

Gray's Sedge

Carex grayi

Gray's sedge, or Mace Sedge is named for its large, easily identifiable seed heads that resemble a midevil mace. The fruits will remain on the stalk through winter, making them excellent for dried flower arrangements.



Cardinal Flower

Lobelia cardinalis

Cardinal flower gets its name from the red robes worn by Roman Catholic cardinals. Spikes of red flowers open over the course of many weeks and reach 3' in height. The flower is known to be a favorite of hummingbirds.

Large-flowered Penstemon

Penstemon grandiflora

The fragrant flowers attract many insects, and it is a host to many species of moth.



Rose Mallow

Hibiscus laevis

Rose mallow is a member of the Hibiscus genus, which is apparent from its 4-5" tropical looking flowers.



This showy, drought-tolerant plant is rarely found in the wild. The large, tubular pink and purple flowers bloom in late spring on spikes reaching 2' in height. It attracts a variety of pollinators, and the fruits are a favorite of birds. The plant is also rarely browsed by deer, making it a great landscape showpiece.



For best results, water plugs twice a week throughout the first summer. Leaf compost or other organic mulch will prevent water loss and suppress weeds. Do not use traditional fertilizer. Our sources are dedicated to providing high quality plants with locally sourced seeds.
